ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

Governance is undergoing a profound transformation as power increasingly operates through digital technologies, algorithms, delegated authorities, private platforms, and institutions beyond traditional territorial boundaries. The International Conference on "Rule of Law at a Transformative Crossroads: Rethinking Public Law, Governance, and Accountability" examines how public law can respond to these evolving forms of power, including algorithmic governance, executive discretion, digital due process, contested territories, displaced legal orders, and the public consequences of private power.

The Conference also considers how constitutional continuity, legal legitimacy, and rights can be preserved in contexts of exile and displacement. As the Indian Supreme Court observed in *S.G. Jaisinghani v. Union of India*, "the absence of arbitrary power is the first essential of the rule of law." The United Nations similarly emphasises accountability of "all persons, institutions and entities, public and private, including the State itself," placing accountability and safeguards against arbitrariness at the heart of the Rule of Law. Half a century later, a 13-judge bench entrenched this principle as part of the Constitution's unamendable "basic structure," holding that Parliament's amending power, however wide, cannot touch the rule of law, separation of powers, or judicial review. The Conference proceeds from the premise that this doctrinal anchor must now be tested against forms of power the 1973 bench never anticipated.

Ultimately, the Conference seeks to reimagine the Rule of Law as a dynamic framework for emerging forms of governance, while safeguarding constitutional values, rights, human agency, and accountable power.

The Conference therefore provides a platform for scholars, practitioners, policymakers, and students to critically examine these emerging challenges and develop innovative legal responses. It aims to foster interdisciplinary dialogue on how public law can remain effective, legitimate, and responsive in an increasingly complex governance landscape.

By bringing together diverse perspectives from constitutional law, technology, international law, and governance, the Conference seeks to bridge theory and practice. It aspires to generate meaningful scholarship and practical pathways for strengthening accountability, protecting rights, and ensuring that the Rule of Law remains resilient in times of institutional and technological change

DR. LOBSANG SANGAY

Senior Visiting Fellow, East Asian Legal Studies Program, Harvard Law School; Former Sikyong (President), Central Tibetan Administration

Dr. Lobsang Sangay is a Senior Visiting Fellow at the East Asian Legal Studies Program, Harvard Law School, and served two terms as the democratically elected Sikyong (President) of the Central Tibetan Administration. He holds an LL.B. from Delhi University and LL.M. and S.J.D. degrees from Harvard Law School. His work focuses on democracy, human rights, the rule of law, and governance in exile, with extensive research on Tibetan law and legal autonomy.

Beyond his political leadership, Lobsang Sangay has been an active advocate for Tibetan human rights, democracy, and greater autonomy. He has represented the Tibetan cause at international forums and continues his academic research and teaching on Tibet, international law, governance, and human rights. He is also the author of several works on Tibetan law, democracy, and the Tibetan government-in-exile.

Consultant to the Prime Minister's Economic Advisory Council, Former Policy Leader Fellow at European University Institute in Florence, Italy.

Apurv Kumar Mishra is presently serving in the Government of India as a Consultant in the Prime Minister's Economic Advisory Council. From February-June 2022, he was a Policy Leader Fellow at European University Institute in Florence, Italy. He previously worked as a senior research fellow at India Foundation, a premier think-tank in India where he led initiatives relating to Indian foreign policy. He was also an adjunct faculty of law at Ashoka University and taught courses on law at several universities including Gandhinagar National Law University and Plaksha University. He is the editor-in-chief of India Law Journal. Apurv is a founding member of Robin Hood Army- a voluntary organisation of young professionals and students that works to get surplus food from restaurants to less fortunate people in 350+ cities across 12 countries.

ABOUT THE THEME

THEME

Rule of Law at a Transformative Crossroads: Rethinking Public Law, Governance, and Accountability

Democratic institutions worldwide are navigating a rapidly evolving public-law landscape shaped by algorithmic decision-making, expanding executive powers, shifting public-private boundaries, and democratic backsliding. Public law is thus being tested on several fronts, as AI-driven administrative decisions, emergency governance, delegated authority, and corporate performance of public functions reshape the Rule of Law, judicial review, administrative discretion, and separation of powers. While these developments may enhance efficiency, they also raise concerns about transparency, human oversight, due process, accountability, institutional trust, and the balance of power. At this “Transformative Crossroads,” longstanding certainties are being renegotiated in real time rather than treated as settled doctrine. The special issue therefore invites critical and comparative scholarship, particularly from Global South, comparative constitutional, law and technology, and interdisciplinary perspectives, examining the Rule of Law as an evolving institutional practice responding to changing configurations of power, technology, and governance.

SUB-THEMES

1. Democracy Beyond Territory: Constitutionalism, Legitimacy & the Rule of Law in Exile

- Legal authority of governments and institutions operating without territorial control.
- Constitutional continuity, courts, and legal orders amid displaced or suspended institutions.
- Recognition and legitimacy questions arising from competing claims to sovereignty.

As of end-2025, 129.4 million people worldwide are forcibly displaced or stateless i.e. roughly 1 in every 70 people on Earth.

2. The Right to Govern, Not Be Governed by Machines: AI, Administrative Power & Regulatory Accountability

- Transparency and human oversight in AI-driven government decisions.
- Algorithmic bias in welfare, licensing, policing, and public service access.
- Judicial review of automated systems like vehicle-registration auctions.

Indian courts are currently sitting on over 5.5 crore pending cases, Supreme Court pendency alone crossed 92,000 in January 2026, the pressure driving the judiciary's turn to AI-assisted case management and research tools.

3. Constitutional Silences, Executive Power & the Limits of Administrative Discretion

- Delegated power, executive discretion, and limits on administrative action.
- Role of tribunals, commissions, and ombudsman institutions in oversight.
- Judicial review as a check against executive excess.

Since 1952, 637 ordinances have been promulgated at the central level in India, with the annual rate nearly doubling to roughly 10–11 a year in 2014–2019 compared to the preceding decade's average.

4. The Right to Be Heard in a Digital State: Due Process Beyond the Digital Divide

- Connectivity, affordability, and digital literacy as barriers to rights access.
- Notice, hearing, and appeal rights in digital administration.
- Need for human intervention and offline alternatives in e-governance.

Rural internet penetration in India stands at just 48.3 per 100 people, and a 2025 study found nearly half of offline rural households remain unconnected not for lack of infrastructure, but because they don't know what the internet is or how to use it.

5. Elections, Democratic Legitimacy & the Rule of Law in Transition

- Institutional independence and integrity in free and fair elections.
- Fairness in electoral roll revisions like SIR and voter verification.
- Deepfakes, disinformation, and AI campaigning's effect on electoral choice.

Deepfake attempts targeting India's 2024 general election rose by an estimated 280% compared to the previous cycle, in a year the World Economic Forum ranked India as the single highest-risk country globally for mis- and disinformation.

6. Environmental Rule of Law: Climate Transition, Development & Institutional Accountability

- Climate change reshaping environmental regulation.
- Independence and accountability of environmental regulators.
- NGT's jurisdiction, remedial powers, and interface with judicial review.

The National Green Tribunal was sitting on over 5,000 pending cases across its five benches as of late 2025, with as few as 6 judicial members in post against a sanctioned strength of 20.

7. Competing Claims, Contested Territories & Conflicting Legal Orders

- Sovereignty disputes and their constitutional implications.
- Courts and transitional authorities maintaining legality amid uncertainty.

There are currently more than 150 active territorial and border disputes worldwide, at least 11 of them involving nuclear-armed states directly or by proxy.

8. Private Power, Public Consequences: Corporations, Platforms & the Expanding Rule of Law

- Corporations and platforms performing traditionally public functions.
- Business and human rights accountability across supply chains and conflict zones.
- Ensuring transparency where private entities shape public life.

The world's five largest corporations by market value now carry a combined valuation of roughly \$16.4 trillion, in the range of an entire national economy the size of China's.

GUIDELINES FOR SUBMISSION

GENERAL GUIDELINES

1. Submissions will pass through **blind peer review**, and acceptance will be subjected to the report of the peer review team.
2. The final paper should be submitted after the notification/communication of acceptance (13 September, 2026) of the abstract.
3. **Eligibility criteria:** The Conference is open to undergraduate and postgraduate students, research scholars, academicians, legal practitioners, professionals, policymakers, and other individuals interested in the relevant areas of law and policy.
4. The final submission shall be concluded within the prescribed deadline. No abstract or full paper shall be accepted after the respective submission deadlines.
5. Paper Presenters have to register after the acceptance of the abstract with payment of the required fees. **Registration and Submission Link shall be provided after acceptance of Abstract.**
6. For participation, registration is mandatory upon confirmation of participation.
7. The Organising Committee reserves the right to accept or reject the submissions at any stage of the review. The decision of the organisers regarding the selection of the papers shall be final. The copyright for all entries shall vest with the organisers who herewith reserve the right to modify the contributions as per the requirements of necessity.
8. There shall be a **zero-tolerance policy on plagiarism**, and a similarity index of up to **10% is permissible**. All final submissions will be subjected to blind peer review and a plagiarism check, after which the selected papers will be considered.
9. An E-certificate will be awarded to the participants presenting the paper.
10. All abstracts must be submitted in .docx format via [Google Form](#).
11. Paper Presenters may visit the Campus or Join Online. However,
12. **No Accommodation** shall be provided by the Organising Committee.

- **Word limit of the Abstract:** 250-300 words.
- **Word limit of the Full Paper:** 3000-5000 (excluding footnotes)
- The main text should be in Times New Roman with font size 12 and line spacing of 1.5.
- The footnotes should be in Times New Roman, font size 10, with line spacing of 1.0.
- One-inch margins on all sides should be maintained.
- **Citation Style:** Bluebook 21st Edition/ APA

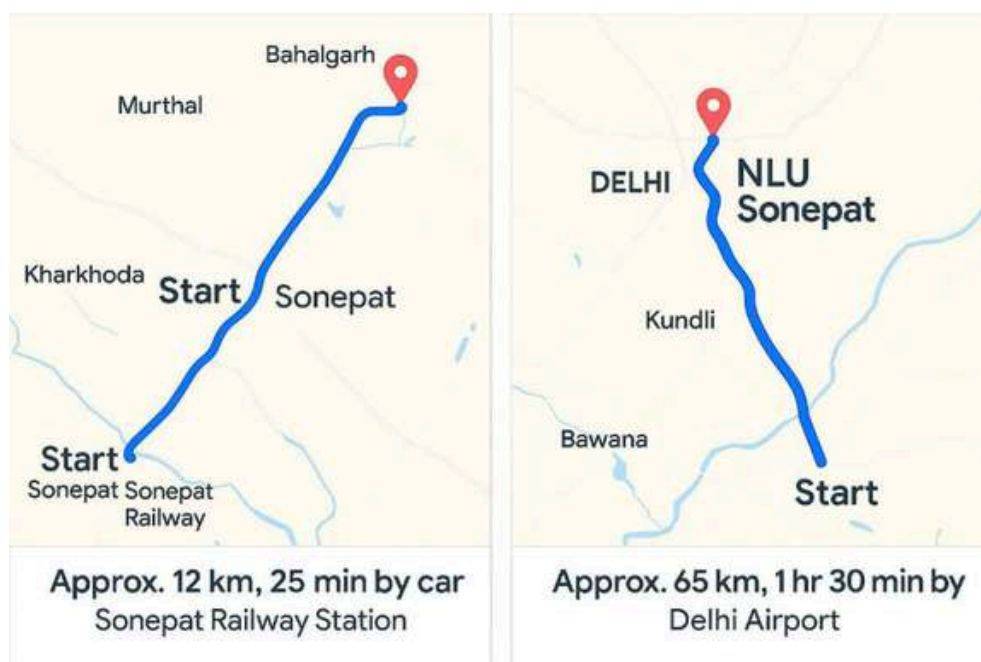
